




What is happening?



On Thursday the 8th June British people can vote in the General Election. British people will be voting to decide who should be their local Member of Parliament (MP).

The party who has the most Members of Parliament (MPs) will form the next Government.



The leader of the party which has the most Members of Parliament (MPs) will be the Prime Minister and will be the leader of the Government.

Deciding who to vote for is a big question. There is lots of information being talked about from the different sides. It can be confusing!

Different organisations have made information to support people to understand about what voting in the General Election means and how we can vote. We have links to information in this document.

Who can vote in the General Election?

Anyone who is over the age of 18 and is registered to vote can vote in the General Election.

Registering to vote means putting your name and address on a list of people who can vote where you live. This is also called the electoral roll.

Important dates to remember

An important date to remember is Monday 22nd of May. If you want to vote this is the date when you must be registered to vote by. You cannot vote in the General Election if you have not registered to vote.

Some of the guides that we have put the links to in the Information section tell you how you can check to see if you are registered and how to register if you are not.

How do I vote?

Once you are registered to vote you can choose to vote in different ways for example in person, in the post or by proxy. Proxy means someone else voting on your behalf.

To vote by post you must apply to do this by the 23rd May. You must send your postal vote so that it arrives by election day the 8th June.

Support at the polling station

If you vote in person you will go to a polling station. There will be staff there who can help you to vote if you need it or your support staff can help you to vote. Polling station staff and your support staff should not tell you who to vote for.

Remember everyone who is registered to vote is allowed to vote. If someone is preventing you from voting or you cannot access your polling station you can call the Electoral Commission 0333 103 1928.
