Sheffield City Council

Sheffield City Council has recently produced a [Cost of Living Support Document](#), which offers general advice on ways in which you can make savings and cut costs as well as tips on fuel and energy support, housing support and grants and funding.

It says: “Over the past few months, millions of people have experienced increases in the cost of living, including rises in petrol, food, and gas and electric charges. This has left many facing tough decisions about how to spend their money, and many others in need of advice and financial support to afford rent, fuel bills, and everyday items. As a result, we have put this list together which shows the resources available in the Sheffield area.”

Disabled People face additional costs to their basic standard of living. The figure has been estimated as being 25% higher than for non-disabled people. Recent research by the disability charity Scope estimates that on average, disabled people spend £550 a month on disability-related expenditure, including higher heating bills, buying specialised equipment, paying for taxis to get around or covering higher insurance premiums .

When dealing with enquiries to our information service and posting news onto our website we often come across information that we think would be useful to put into a general factsheet about managing your finances. Maximise Your Income



“Make sure you're getting the benefits and funding you are entitled to”

First of all make sure you're getting the benefits you are entitled to. The benefits system is complex which means you may not be. For example:

Are you missing out on Attendance Allowance?

Attendance Allowance is underclaimed in Sheffield in comparison to other large cities such as Manchester. Attendance allowance is a tax-free benefit paid to people over 65 who need help to look after themselves because of physical or mental disability, but you do not need to actually be receiving help. There are two rates of payment, a lower rate and a higher rate. **AA is tax free and not means tested.** You can get a free factsheet from [Disability](#)

Contact Citizens Advice Sheffield

Citizens Advice Sheffield is a city wide service provides free, independent, confidential and impartial advice to everyone on their rights and responsibilities and helps people resolve their problems with benefits, work, debt and money, consumer, discrimination and many other issues. You can ask for a benefits check at your local advice centre. You can easily find your nearest advice centre on the [Citizens Advice Sheffield](#) website. Click on 'Get Help' and then 'Get Started' and enter your postcode. Click on 'Help Yourself' for online free advice and self-help resources.

You can also phone Citizens Advice Sheffield's Adviceline on 03444 113 111 (Monday to Friday, 10am to 4pm). Calls to the Adviceline cost the same as calling 0114 numbers.

Claiming Reduced Charges

Disability Related Expenditure (DRE)

If you are eligible for a personal budget from adult social care you may have to make a contribution towards the costs. If so make sure that you ask about claiming any disability related expenditure . A DRE is an expense that costs you more because you are disabled or which you

wouldn't have to pay at all if you were not disabled e.g City Wide Care Alarms, extra heating costs, laundry costs and maintenance and repair of equipment, special diet. Some disabled people are not aware that you can be in paid employment and still claim a personal budget .To encourage disabled people to work, income from earnings is disregarded during the financial assessment for a personal budget from adult social care. VAT Exemption on Purchasing Equipment

You may be eligible to claim exemption from paying VAT charges when purchasing equipment if you declare that you are chronically sick or have a disabling condition.

The following criteria apply:-

- You have a physical or mental impairment that has a long-term and severe effect on your ability to carry out everyday activities
- You have a condition that doctors treat as a chronic sickness (like diabetes, for example) or
- You are terminally ill

Also, VAT is not charged on certain services provided to disabled people including

- the servicing, maintenance and installation of disability equipment
- adaptation work on equipment or appliances so a disabled person can use them
- some building alterations to a disabled person's home
- the hire of qualifying disability equipment

Most reputable companies will identify VAT exemption in their charging details.

If you are in any doubt as to whether you are eligible for VAT exemption contact HM Revenue and Custom [Enquiries](#) on 0300 200 3700 (please check the charges with your service provider).

Please note that there are penalties for making false declarations.

Council Tax: Disabled Person's Relief

If you or someone who lives in your household has a disability and your home has been adapted to meet the needs of the disabled person, you may qualify for a reduction in Council Tax.

Information is on the Sheffield Council website on [this page](#). However, we recommend that you also look at GOV.UK the government's website which lists other qualifying criteria on their [Council Tax page](#)

In particular you may be eligible for the scheme if you live in a larger property than you would need if you or another occupant weren't disabled.

You'll have to show that you've either:

- an extra bathroom, kitchen or other room that you need for the disabled person, or
- extra space inside the property for using a wheelchair

If you feel that you would qualify using this criteria we know of people who have successfully applied on these grounds.

TV Licence Reduction

You can get a 50% reduction on the TV Licence fee if you're blind/severely sight impaired. Your licence will also cover anyone who lives with you. [TV licence reduction](#)

You may also qualify for a reduction if you are a care home resident. [Care home resident reduction](#)

When you reach the age of 75 you may apply for a [free TV Licence](#).

Disabled Person's Railcard

The Disabled Person's Railcard is distributed by the Association of Train Operating Companies. It entitles a disabled person and an adult companion to up to a third off most rail journeys in Britain.

The English National Concessionary Travel Scheme (ENCTS) in South Yorkshire enables Disabled ENCTS pass holders to travel for free on bus, tram and rail services between 0930 and 2300 on weekdays and at any time during the weekend and on Bank Holiday . A

“With carer” pass is available.

Driving

Blue Badge Scheme

The Blue Badge scheme provides a national range of parking concessions for disabled people with severe mobility problems who have difficulty using public transport. The scheme is designed to help severely disabled people to travel independently, as either a driver or passenger, by allowing them to park as close to their destination as possible. Motability Scheme

Motability has helped over 4 million people get mobile by exchanging their mobility allowance to lease a car, scooter or powered wheelchair. You can check whether you qualify and get an information pack [here](#)

If you are a Motability customer or you are applying to join the Motability Scheme, you may be eligible for additional [financial help](#) towards the following costs depending on a wide range of factors, including your disability or impairment and how it impacts your mobility, your household circumstances, any equipment you need to regularly travel with and your financial means

- Help with the cost of Advance Payments, WAVs and adaptations
- Help with the cost of driving lessons
- Help with the cost of a Drive-from-Wheelchair vehicle

Toll concessions – bridges and tunnels

You may be able to pay a reduced rate or nothing at some river crossings, bridges and tunnels if you’re disabled. In most cases, you have to apply in advance to get a concession.

Don’t forget, be embarrassed, or be too proud to ask if there's a concession available. Many tourist attractions want your custom and provide a discount.

Sheffield LifeCARD and LifeCARD Plus

Sheffield lifeCARD gives you significant savings on sport and leisure activities across Sheffield International Venues Centres as well as access to offers throughout the year. LifeCARD Plus was introduced at Sheffield International Venues (SIV) in 2016 to replace the Slice Card at a cost of £5.00 per card for 1 year. The LifeCARD Plus offers the holder up to 30% off the LifeCARD Price.

The criteria eligibility for the LifeCARD Plus is as follows:

- Income Support
- Income based Job Seekers Allowance (JSA) 7

- Income Related Employment Support Allowance (ESA)
- Pension Credit
- Working Tax Credit
- Child Tax Credit
- Universal Credit
- Housing Benefit
- Disability Living Allowance (DLA)
- Personal Independent Payment (PiP)
- Blue Badge Holders
- Attendance Allowance
- War Disablement Pension
- Children (Under 17 years) qualifying for any of the above benefits or looked after by the local authority are also entitled to the LifeCARD Plus.

SIV will accept the following proofs:

- An in date letter from a benefit
- Blue Badge

Places for People will also be operating a similar card called “SheffieldSaver Plus” .

SIV will accept the Places for People Card and any current Slice cards that are due to renew; the customers will need to bring in proof (from the criteria above) so they can get the benefits of a life card plus.

A **GP exercise referral scheme** is available in Sheffield that offers access to specialist exercise programmes for people with chronic medical conditions. The scheme is supervised by qualified fitness staff who will aim to ensure you have a safe and enjoyable start to a more active and healthier lifestyle. Ask at your GP surgery for more information. Accessible Sheffield Partnership

Accessible Sheffield is a pioneering partnership between AccessAble, Disability Sheffield, Nimbus Disability and Sheffield City Council towards making Sheffield a more accessible City for disabled people.

It was designed to quickly let providers know about the needs a disabled person has and is simplifying the bookings process for theatres, arena and music venues across the UK. Carer Card

The Carer Card is similar to the Access Card in that it informs providers quickly and discreetly about the support you need as a Carer and may gain you access to things like concessionary goods and services without having to go into lots of confidential personal detail. Sheffield Theatres

Sheffield Theatres offers a disabled person who needs a carer with one ticket at the disabled persons discount (normally £2.50 off) if it applies to that particular performance and one free ticket for the carer. You can use your [Access Card](#) or [Carer Card](#) at either of the Theatres where all Access Card symbols are acknowledged and responded to when booking including free companion tickets for +1s. Box office staff are able to take your booking in person, or on the telephone and advise you on the best access available.

Cinema Exhibitors' Association Card

The Cinema Exhibitors' Association Card entitles the carer of a disabled person to go free when accompanying them to see a film.

TimeCredits are not given as an incentive but as an invitation to get more involved and to contribute as a person rather than a consumer.

Do you have a Disability? Are you a parent or carer of a disabled child or adult? If so, use this website to save time finding disability grants. Charities and trusts provide funding towards the high cost of disability equipment, holidays, housing, days out.....in fact anything above and beyond the normal costs of everyday living.

Disability Grants provides information about specific [grants for holidays](#). A list of funders can be found here for you to look through. You will then need to make an application to any that you feel are suitable either in terms of your eligibility and/or the holidays that they offer.

Local Assistance Scheme : Grants from Sheffield City Council

The aim of the **Local Assistance Scheme** is to support independent living and help Sheffield residents in crisis situations with an identified need that cannot be met from another source. Help

will be available to people who receive certain benefits or are assessed to have insufficient income to meet their needs.

The scheme was set up following the abolition of some parts of the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP) Social Fund (Community Care Grants and Crisis Loans).

While the Local Assistance Scheme is quite similar to the Social Fund in purpose, it is not the same scheme and has its own policy, rules and awards.

The Local Assistance Scheme has two types of award:

1) Sheffield Independence Grants

Sheffield Independence Grants are to support independent living in the community. They can be used to help people establish themselves in the community or to remain there. For example they may be used to help people setting up home following a period in institutional care, avoid the need to go into care or cope with exceptionally difficult family circumstances. A Sheffield Independence Grant can be awarded to help with the cost of essential household items and services (including travel costs in particular circumstances).

Sheffield Independence Grants do not have to be paid back.

2) Sheffield Crisis Grants

Sheffield Crisis Grants are intended to help people who do not have enough money to meet their short term needs arising from a crisis. They are used to prevent serious risk to the health and safety of an individual or their family.

Sheffield Crisis Grants do not have to be paid back.
